Executive Summary



background

St. Clare Hospital is pleased to present the 2018 Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA). This CHNA report provides an overview of the health needs and priorities associated with our service area.

The goal of this report is to provide individuals with a deeper understanding of the health needs in the communities we serve, as well as help guide the hospital in its community health improvement implementation planning efforts and development of an strategy to address evaluated needs.

The SSM Health Wisconsin Regional Board approved this CHNA November 15, 2018. St. Clare Hospital last conducted a CHNA in 2015.

The Affordable Care Act (ACA) requires 501(c)(3), tax-exempt hospitals to conduct a CHNA every three years and adopt a strategic implementation plan for addressing identified needs.



priorities

St. Clare Hospital – Baraboo determined priorities for the 2018 CHNA to include:

- Mental Health a major public health concern due to limited access to resources and the lack of mental health facilities, with many patients having to drive hours for treatment. Out of the 14 choices listed on the 2018 Sauk County Health & Wellness Coalition survey, mental health was ranked as the #1 health problem in our community. All key informant groups brought Mental Health to the forefront of the discussion. Mental illness, especially depression, escalates the risk for many physical health problems, particularly long-lasting conditions such as type 2 diabetes, stroke and heart disease.
- Chronic Disease a growing concern with heart disease and diabetes increasing across Sauk County due to an aging population and obesity rates. Of 14 choices, heart disease/stroke was ranked the second most important health problem in our community
- Obesity the disorder associated with illnesses directly caused or worsened by significant weight and lack of nutritional foods or food knowledge. Obesity is a continual issue in our community. Of the 14 choices on the 2018 Sauk County Health & Wellness Coalition survey, being overweight was ranked the third most important risky behavior.

strategies

Mental Health

Hold steady the number of poor mental health days in Sauk County from 3.4 in 2018 to 3.4 in 2021. (County Health Rankings)

Reduce the number of mental health patients inpatient or outpatient at St. Clare Hospital with a suicidal attempt or ideation as a primary or secondary diagnosis from 12 per year ending 2018 to 10 by 2021.

Chronic Disease

Reduce the number of age-adjusted deaths due to heart disease in Sauk County from 163.5 deaths per 100,000 persons in 2018 to 160.0 by 2021. (Community Commons)

Hold steady the percentage of adults with diabetes in Sauk County from 10% in 2018 to 10% by 2021. (*County Health Rankings*)

Reduce the number of age-adjusted deaths due to diabetes in Sauk County from 41.5 deaths per 100,000 persons in 2017 to 41 by 2021. (Community Commons)

Reduce the number of heart failure readmissions to St. Clare Hospital from Sauk County from 16 in August 2018 to 14 by 2021.

Obesity

Reduce the percentage of Sauk County adult residents who are sedentary from 23% in 2018 to 22% by 2021. (County Health Rankings)

Reduce the number of emergency department visits at St. Clare Hospital for uncontrolled diabetes from Sauk County residents from 70 in September 2018 to 60 in 2021.




About Our Community



The data, was derived from a variety of sources including 1Community Commons. The Community Commons platform utilizes data, tools and stories to inspire change and improve communities. Thousands of meaningful data layers allow mapping and reporting capabilities for a thorough exploration of community health. The site is managed by the Institute for People, Place and Possibility, the Center for Applied Research and Environmental Systems and Community Initiatives. They also partner with organizations such as the American Heart Association and the CDC. Additional data sources include the ²Wisconsin County Health Ranking and the ³Sauk County Health & Wellness Coalition Survey 2018. Obesity

31-35% of adults are obese in Sauk County²

Out of 17 choices, drug abuse and alcohol abuse were listed as the top two risky behaviors in our community.3 38.13% of respondents reported binge drinking at least once in the past month.3

Heart Disease

25.4% of adults in Sauk County have high blood pressure.1 Out of 14 choices, heart disease and stroke were listed as the second most important health problem in our community.3



Suicide

The suicide death rate is higher in Sauk County than both state and national averages.1





Mental Health

Out of 14 choices, Mental Health was ranked to be the #1 health problem in our community with 81.99% of respondents claiming it to be a major health issue.3

The Health Needs of Our Community

In addition to the primary research collected from the Sauk County Health & Wellness Coalition survey and the secondary research from online data sources, St. Clare Hospital held four key informant meetings with stakeholders representing the broad interests of the St. Clare Hospital community, as well as attended four additional forums. The groups included law enforcement, public health officials and subject matter experts, community leaders, St. Clare-affiliated clinicians, administrators and staff. Each meeting was discussion-based with a discussion lead probing for information relating to general community issues and concerns, issues in the community that promote poor health, issues related to health care access and perceptions of local community health care. At each meeting, the top health concerns were identified and stakeholders voted on which issues were of top priority.

The issues identified were mental health, obesity and nutrition (lack of nutrition education), chronic disease (diabetes), drug and alcohol addiction, lack of transportation, lack of affordable housing, dental health, access to healthcare and suicide.

Stakeholder rankings were taken into consideration when choosing the final top three priorities. St. Clare Hospital leadership endorsed and actively supports the identified areas and will continue to collaborate with the Sauk County Health & Wellness Coalition as part of a January 2019 community forum and ideation seminar. It will be open to all residents of Sauk and surrounding counties to share ideas, input and resources to improve population health. While the results will be available after approval of this document by the SSM Health Wisconsin Regional Board, they will be considered as part of potential additional collaborative opportunities for the 2019-2021 plan.

key priorities

Mental Health



Mental health was confirmed by community feedback and data research to be a health needs priority.

Approximately 1 in 5 adults in the U.S. experiences mental illness in a given year. Among the 20.2 million adults in the U.S. who experienced a substance use disorder, 50.5% had a co-occurring mental illness. Suicide is the 10th leading cause of death in the U.S., the 3rd leading cause of death for people aged 10–14 and the 2nd leading cause of death for people aged 15–24.

Obesity



Obesity was an issue expressed in the community feedback and was verified by data research.

Obesity affects about 93.3 million U.S. adults. Obesity-related conditions include heart disease, stroke, type 2 diabetes and certain types of cancer, some of the leading causes of preventable death.

Obesity is a result of combined causes and contributing factors including behavior, genetics, physical activity and food options.

Chronic Disease



Chronic disease, inclusive of diabetes and heart disease, was confirmed by community feedback and data to be a health needs priority.

One in two adults in the US has a chronic disease and one in four adults has two or more. Chronic diseases such as heart disease, cancer and diabetes are the leading causes of death and disability in the United States.

Behaviors contributing to chronic disease are poor nutrition and lack of physical activity.

community perception survey

Primary

The primary data consisted of a community perception survey (see Sauk County Healthy Communities - pg 17) as well as focus groups including key stakeholders within the Sauk County communities.

The Sauk County Health & Wellness Coalition created the survey and all questions underwent a health literacy review. The community perception survey was conducted over a four month period in the following manner:

- The coalition made the survey available both online and in written format. Diverse populations had access to translators to complete the survey form.
- The 110 question survey covered a wide range of topics from access to care, quality of life, chronic disease, demographics, community health perceptions, health care access, physical activity, nutrition, abuse, safety, alcohol and drug use, community resiliency and lifestyle factors.
- The survey database (SurveyMonkey) used skip logic to only show questions relevant to the survey respondent in regards to their answers to previous questions.
- With the help of the entire coalition, St. Clare Hospital advertised the survey in various ways:
 - Newspaper ads in the Baraboo News Republic, Reedsburg Times Press, Wisconsin Dells Events and the Sauk Prairie Eagle
 - Online advertisements on websites and social media sites for each entity in the Health and Wellness Coalition
 - Radio interviews on WPQR Baraboo and the Magnum Radio Group stations
 - Media articles sharing purpose and information surrounding the survey
 - Internal communications within the Coalition entities
 - Local events such as the Sauk County Fair and Baraboo Circus Parade
 - Flyers advertising the survey were created and distributed at events
 - Flyers were also handed out to local organizations including libraries, Aging and Disability Center (ADRC), Veteran's Office, The Department of Human Services, grocery stores and local businesses
- 1,053 surveys were needed to have a confidence level of 95% and a confidence interval of 3 since the hospital service area has a total population of 73,275. St. Clare Hospital was able to collect 1,602 responses.
- Once the survey responses were tabulated, the survey results were evaluated and analyzed for health and demographic trends.
- The full results were distributed to, and discussed by, the coalition in bi-weekly meetings.

Primary - continued

The focus groups consisted of key community stakeholders. The hospital had a total of 47 people participating in the St. Clare specific focus groups. See Appendix B for a complete list of invitees and their associated affiliations. The focus group questions are listed in Table One, page 14.

Additional focus groups or interviews were used to gain information from the community regarding their perceptions of the community's health including the elderly, Hispanic, Amish and Native American populations who were not well represented in the survey.

A list of 14 community listening session questions were created regarding community health perception. Topics included community health, health care access, health literacy, health problems, transportation and food security. Six additional questions were asked about specific issues facing elderly people, availability of resources, knowledge of the ADRC and vaccination rates.

The questions were screened for health literacy and motivational interviewing and were also translated into Spanish. Data from the elderly population was obtained at foot clinics, dining centers and Golden K's meetings. Data from the Hispanic population was obtained from Lake Delton, Wisconsin Dells and Sauk Prairie community residents. The focus group data was analyzed and presented to the coalition.

Secondary

In addition to a review of demographics, St. Clare Hospital gathered and reviewed data from broad sources to set the initial direction and priorities of the community health needs assessment. The secondary data was derived from a variety of sources including the Wisconsin County Health Rankings & Roadmaps, Community Commons, Wisconsin Department of Health and Human Resources, CDC Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System, National Center for Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Population and the Wisconsin Behavioral Risk Factor Survey.

prioritizing health needs

As part of the CHNA requirement, hospitals are required to evaluate the needs that are identified and validated through the data analysis. In order to do so, hospitals must establish specific criteria that will be used to assess each of the identified community needs. The system has recommended criteria and ratings that each hospital can use during prioritization. The method used to evaluate the needs as well as potential weighting is customizable based on the hospital's approach.

Prior to review of the data, a list of criteria was developed to aid in the selection of priority areas. During the data-review process, attention was directed to health issues that met any of these criteria:

- Health issues that impact a lot of people or for which disparities exist, and which put a greater burden on some population groups
- Poor rankings for health issues in Sauk County as compared to the State of Wisconsin, other counties or Healthy People 2020 national health targets
- · Health issues for which trends are worsening
- Health issues that are among national and state health priorities or the national targets for the issues are not met
- · Health issues that are of concern to community residents and leaders

A two-step prioritization process is recommended. Step one of this process focuses on community-specific criteria that are rated by community members to evaluate the identified needs. This step is subjective and measures community member's perceptions of the identified needs using a strongly agree to strongly disagree 5-point Likert scale. Once the community has evaluated their needs based on their perceptions, step two is that this list is sorted in descending order by priority and then reviewed by your internal prioritization team using system feasibility criteria. The internal criteria are more objective and focused on alignment to key strategies, resources, magnitude of issue and overall capability. Based on internal prioritization, the top ranking priorities establish the areas of focus for the Strategic Implementation Plan.

The Sauk County Health & Wellness Coalition also considered indicators that relate to previous CHNAs from all of its entities. Along with this data, St. Clare Hospital also took into consideration the primary health issues listed in the hospital's last CHNA.

Finally, St. Clare Hospital examined "social determinants of health" or factors in the community that can either contribute to poor health outcomes or support a healthy community. This data was derived by the County Health Rankings Report for Sauk County, as well as from the online survey.

The online survey identified the top three health needs as mental health, heart disease & stroke and drug problems, with obesity listed as the fourth health need. During our key informant meetings, these needs were discussed with mental health continually at the top of the list of priorities. Key informants repeatedly emphasized obesity in all meetings, which placed it at a higher priority over substance abuse.
