St. Mary's School of Nursing alumni celebration

Graduates of the classes of 1969 through 1974 were honored with a final Golden Jubilee.

Alumni from St. Mary's School of Nursing and special guests gathered at the Sheraton Hotel in Madison on Saturday, September 23 to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the school's opening and to honor the last six graduating classes with a final Golden Jubilee.

It was a joyous day for celebration with messages from alumni and SSM Health leaders including a slideshow of historic photos of the school and its students. One highlight of the day was the memories shared by Sister Mary Jean Ryan, a member of the 1959 class of St. Mary's School of Nursing who went on to become the first president of SSM Health in 1986.

"Can anyone forget the first injection we gave to a real person that somehow wasn't at all like the oranges we practiced on?" she said. "We had great fun while we learned a lot and made friendships that have lasted our lifetimes. We celebrate all of that, and most of all we are privileged to celebrate a shared history that gives us every right to be proud of the nurses we became. Because we became nurses of character, thanks to the best education we could have had, and with the knowledge that we were and are part of an honorable, very noble profession."

Sister Mary Jean wrapped up her comments with a champagne toast, saying, "Here's to the memories and the friendships we cherish, the joys we've shared, the dreams we've dreamt, and most of all, here's to us!"

Following lunch, alumni association president Marijo Bunbury, class of 1968, shared remarks and presented the six classes of jubilarians. "It was well known that a St. Mary's nurse was a great nurse," Marijo recalled. She described the three impressionable years they lived, learned, and cared for patients on St. Mary's campus, and concluded by reminding her fellow alumni that "St. Mary's will always be your home." The event was capped off with the singing of the hymn "The Bells of St. Mary's," a long-standing tradition and ode to the chapel bell that tolled at St. Mary's for 46 years (1926-1972).

Two new leaders joined the SSM Health Madison family recently and we sat down with them to learn a little more about them, their leadership style and vision.



**Eric Thornton, President
SSM Health St. Mary's
Hospital - Madison**

In August, Eric Thornton transitioned into his new role as president of St. Mary's Hospital - Madison. A long-time member of the SSM Health family, Eric began with Dean Health Plan in 2000, and in 2010 joined the planning team for the SSM Health's Janesville campus. After serving in Human Resources and Operations leadership roles, Eric became the hospital's president in November of 2019. Under his leadership, SSM Health St. Mary's Hospital - Janesville has consistently achieved CMS Five-Star ratings. Eric is proud to join the Madison leadership team and excited about St. Mary's Hospital's vision for the future as a regional hub for tertiary care.

Eric attended the University of Wisconsin - Whitewater and holds a Master of Business Administration degree with a focus on general management and human resources management as well as a bachelor's degree in human resources management. His call to a career in health care echoed others influential in his life. Growing up, Eric's grandfather was the administrator for the Janesville Medical Center. In college, he interned at a hospital human resources department, and his wife, Cheryl, has enjoyed a long career as a registered nurse. Eric knows what it means to provide life-sustaining and compassionate care and understands how difficult and rewarding it can be.

What was your impression of St. Mary's Hospital - Madison when you first came into this new leadership role?

A seasoned health care leader, Dawit came to SSM Health from the Havasu Regional Medical Center in Arizona, where he had served as the chief operations officer and interim chief executive officer since August 2022. Prior to his work in Arizona, Dawit held several positions from July 2013 to March 2022 with Sutter Health, a Northern California not-for-profit health system. He served as an administrative fellow, a lean consultant, and surgery center administrator before culminating his time with Sutter as assistant administrator for Sutter Santa Rosa Regional Hospital in Sacramento, California.

Dawit holds a master's degree in health services administration from the University of Michigan and a Bachelor of Arts in public health from University of California-Berkeley. He is responsible for overseeing operations across SSM Health's health ministries in southern Wisconsin markets including Monroe, Janesville and Madison, and will work closely with those leaders.

What was your first impression of SSM Health and the Madison area community?

In my first few days of orientation, I was really impacted by how connected to the Mission everyone was. While every organization has a mission statement, there is a unique focus on it at SSM Health. Each person can recite the Mission statement and connect their work to it. It is powerful to see.

As for my impressions of the Madison community, I had been in the Midwest before and people in Madison really live up to the culture of "Midwest nice". People here are really kind, which contributes to the well-being of the community.

What are your priorities as a leader?

During the first six to nine months, my priority is to learn - to understand the history of each ministry and how they intersect within the continuum of care. I believe you first must know where you came from and understand the past to provide a clear vision for the future.

Healing Hands campaign

As a comprehensive campaign, *Healing Hands* aims to put the most advanced tools in the healing hands of our skilled providers while also providing philanthropic support for emerging needs, clinical education, and the advancement of community health initiatives. In wrapping around the hospital's core needs, the campaign will aid in the recruitment of talented students, nurses, advanced practitioners, and physicians who are critical to delivering tertiary care. This truly reflects SSM Health's longtime commitment to our Mission and Values, as well as our vision for **"Peace, hope, and health for every person, family, and community, especially those most in need."**

111 years of compassionate care

Expanding upon SSM Health St. Mary's Hospital - Madison's more than 110-year history of providing compassionate, Mission-based care in Dane County, SSM Health St. Mary's Foundation launched a bold campaign to provide more than \$10 million in philanthropic support to power the organization into a forward-looking era of advanced surgical services and patient care.

Philanthropy has been integral to St. Mary's Hospital and, in fact, helped to build St. Mary's Hospital more than a century ago when eight religious sisters conducted a postcard campaign. The sisters raised the \$25,000 needed to begin construction of the original building. The last comprehensive campaign supported the hospital's East Wing expansion in 2008, which nearly doubled the hospital's size, adding a rooftop helipad and cardiovascular surgical care suites.

Through the *Healing Hands* campaign, philanthropy will once again allow St. Mary's Hospital to realize its goal for the future — to improve access to high-quality, high-value care to meet our community's growing need for complex care.

Impact of early campaign support

Early leadership giving and commitments to the *Healing Hands* campaign have already funded the extraordinary work of a dedicated cardiothoracic team led by Dr. Ghulam Murtaza. This skilled team is converting complex open-heart surgeries to less-invasive, robot-assisted cardiac procedures, reducing patient recovery time from months to weeks — the only program of its kind in Dane County.

Dr. Murtaza and his cardiothoracic surgical team performed their first robot-assisted mitral valve repair in July 2022.

Annabelle was all smiles the morning after surgery, knowing she could soon get back to the life she enjoys with a mended heart.

Benefits of minimally invasive surgery

At 89 years old, Annabelle required a double mitral valve repair, successfully completed by Dr. Murtaza and team in August. Without this level of technology, Annabelle might not have otherwise been a good candidate for traditional open-heart surgery. She shares how blessed she was for the healing hands of her care team who had access to a robotic system for her minimally invasive procedure. “I’m so grateful this procedure is available at St. Mary’s Hospital,” she said. “It allowed a quick recovery to get me back home.”

Cardiac center for excellence

Dr. Murtaza and his team sought guidance from the world leaders at the University of Chicago Medical Center and University of West Virginia to train and build the skill set needed. St. Mary’s Hospital is the only hospital in Dane County and one of 150 hospitals nationwide to offer robot-assisted minimally invasive intracardiac surgery for heart disease patients. Using the da Vinci surgical robotic system, St. Mary’s Hospital can transform these complex procedures from open-heart surgeries to less invasive procedures, reducing recovery time from months to weeks.

Benefits across areas of care

Advancing traditional surgical procedures to less-invasive robotic surgery offers significant benefits to patients, including reduced length of stay, less pain, fewer complications, and a quicker recovery. From the physicians’ perspective, robot-assisted surgery allows doctors to use tiny instruments to perform complex procedures with more precision, flexibility, and control than is possible with conventional techniques. The surgeon controls the instruments and benefits from the enhanced visualization, accuracy, and reach of the robotic arms.

With applications spanning a wide range of patient needs, robotics are growing in use for complex procedures in nearly all areas of care including cardiothoracic, colorectal, gynecological, head and neck, urologic, orthopedics, and general surgery.

Like Annabelle, other patients have benefited first-hand from the advanced technology of robot-assisted surgery. As a physical therapist, Anma works with patients after traditional surgeries and understands the challenges many experience with the time it takes to regain mobility and fully heal. Dr. Murtaza performed a lumpectomy on Anma’s right breast utilizing the da Vinci robot earlier this year. With her minimally invasive procedure, Anma felt fortunate to have left the hospital the day after surgery and was surprised by how quickly she got back to daily activities without any setbacks.
